ProDomo – Prosopography of religious orders

Colloquia Historico-Critica (CHC) is a lecture series initiated by the Pez research group and organized by the Association for the Study of Monastic Learning in the Early Modern Period. It aims at a pluri-perspective discussion of a specific topic or source in front of a broader audience. – This CHC will be dedicated to the prosopography of religious orders, and will present some of the results of a (closed) workshop held the days before. This workshop will bring together scholars working with large datasets regarding members of the regular clergy, and digital humanities scholars who are interested in questions of prosopography at large. The colloquium will wrap up discussions about source challenges, data interoperability and strategic planning.

Georg Vogeler (professor for Digital Humanities / University of Graz) and Thomas Wallnig (Privatdozent and PI of the current Pez correspondence project / University of Vienna) will chair the colloquium and set the frame for the discussion. John Bradley (Senior Lecturer / King's College London) and Francesco Beretta (Chargé de recherche / CNRS-Université de Lyon) will contribute thoughts from the perspective of data modelling and digital data processing, while P. Alkuin Schachenmayr OCist (Professor at Heiligenkreuz Catholic Seminary / Lower Austria) will address the field of monastic archives, their sources, their users and their profiles as active religious institutions.

The colloquium will be organized as a round-table discussion, and take place in Hörsaal 45 at the main building of the University of Vienna.
